


## ECDA AGM 2021

Challenging Behaviors! Behavioral Kid! Hard to handle! A Handful!

There are a variety of commonly used terms that we use to identify children in our learning environments that are behaving and communicating in ways that we find hard to understand, many times disruptive, and non-adaptive. These general terms help us to label a behavior that we haven't fully understood, making it very hard for us to teach a student how to behave differently. In this session we will explore functions of behavior (what is driving it), form of behavior (what does it look like- lagging skills, under developed skill), and how understanding children's behavior is the first step in creating a plan to change it! Understanding behaviors will not only help us in shifting how we communicate with a kiddo who is engaged in challenging behaviors, but will also help us modify our learning environment to support all children in our space.





Chelsey Broderick is the Behavior Intervention Consultant with the Public School Branch of Prince Edward Island. In her role she supports behavior management provincially at all 56 schools in the English Language School District. She has worked in a variety of roles with the Department of Education and PSB, and the core focus of these professional experiences has been identifying and understanding challenging behaviors in children, and helping educators with strategies to support their learning environments. Chelsey lives in Cornwall, PEI with her husband Omar, their two children, Max and Mila, and their fur baby Charlie. She is focused on connection with students, prevention/ early intervention as a crucial component to success for kiddos, and creating environments where cool cats and kittens can really shine.

## "Baby Talk"-- Encouraging Language Development with Infants and Toddlers with Nancy Tovell (Bookmates)

September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2021 6:30 -8:30



This online workshop focuses on how we can support children's language development in the early years. Included will be practical, interactive strategies to help children engage and communicate with their caregivers. Some of the topics covered will be:

- Children's conversational styles
- The roles caregivers play
- Knowing how and why children communicate and how we can more effectively support them
- Strategies we can use to encourage interaction and conversation
- · How to use rhymes and stories to help build emergent literacy skills
- Ways of supporting families as partners in building language skills

Bookmates is a Manitoba based not-for-profit organization, established in 1984 with a mission to develop and deliver early years programs and training to build and support the foundations of literacy and learning. We are regularly invited to present at conferences and workshops to share our expertise. ## Flipping the Script on Challenging Behaviors with Nicole MacRae

October 7<sup>th</sup>, 2021 6:00 -8:00 PM Location TBD

This workshop aims to provide new and innovative understanding for why children struggle with severe and challenging behaviors, including emotional dysregulation. It also will provide over 30 evidence-based, creative, child-focused strategies and interventions to support children who are struggling with severe and challenging behaviors. The workshop will utilize real-life case examples and scenarios (\*some details will be altered to ensure client confidentiality), interactive small and large group discussions as well as some hands on activities to ensure your learning experience is both supportive. and practical, to your professional development goals.

Nicole MacRae is a Clinical Social Worker and Certified Trauma Therapist. She is the owner of Oak and Cedar Counselling Services and provides trauma-informed and compassion-focused therapy to Children, Adolescents, Parents and Adults, in particular in the area of Trauma, Grief and Loss and Perinatal Mental Health. As it relates to Children, Nicole has her certification in EMDR, along with extensive training in Art and Play Therapy, Attachment-Focused Parenting and Education, and Child Development - including the Impacts of Adverse Childhood Experiences on the developing child. In addition to therapy, Nicole frequently provides consultation and education services to Teachers, Early Childhood Educators, Educational Assistants and Schools to better understand and support children who are struggling with challenging and severe emotional and behavioral needs.

Promoting responsive feeding is a way for educators to support children with their ability to develop healthy eating habits, appropriate food intake and self-regulation which is linked with their cognitive, emotional, and social development.


Misty Rossiter is a Registered Dietitian and an Associate Professor in the Department of Applied Human Sciences at the University of Prince Edward Island. Misty is interested in early childhood development with a particular focus on responsive feeding practices and healthy eating environments.

Misty has published literature and given presentations across Canada on responsive feeding practices during the early years. Her current research program is highlighting collaborative work between educators, families, academics, and policy makers in the Maritime Provinces to utilize the revised Canada's Food Guide and to promote responsive feeding environments in early childhood settings. Her work aims to support educators, families and children who struggle with mealtime feeding and to encourage early learning environments that foster a healthy relationship with food for all children.

## The Bullying Project: How to Stop Aggression and Foster Healthy Relationships - Melinda Walden

November 30th, 2021 6:00 -8:00 p.m Online



For Early Childhood Educators, addressing children's challenging behaviours can be an overwhelming part of our job, and sometimes we feel like we are not equipped to handle them. This is particularly the case when there are children who display aggressive behaviours or those who cannot be assertive and stand up for themselves. We tend to label these two groups of children as 'bullies' or 'victims;' however, this only adds to the problem of addressing challenging behaviours. How do we eliminate these labels and instead talk about how to foster healthy relationships among children?

In this workshop, we will explore:

- What is a 'healthy' relationship?
- What is bullying?
- What are some suggestions for dealing with aggressive behaviour in children?
- What we can do to help children gain the social skills needed to be in a healthy relationship?

By the end of this workshop, you will be able to recognize if our society has a bullying problem or we need to work on fostering healthy relationships.

Melinda Walden has been in the Early Childhood Education field for 20 years. She has been a front line ECE in a variety of child care settings, including preschool, school age, and nursery centres, with experience in infant and family child care as well. Currently, Melinda is an ECE Instructor in the Workplace Program at Red River College in Winnipeg. Every chance she gets, she shares her passion about the kinds of play that are usually restricted by adults and proudly applies her knowledge with her two young sons.
